Prepositions

Prepositions are words that give you some information about the position, direction, etc. of an object or person. They hook the noun and pronoun onto the subject and always go before the noun.

Prepositions are of various types:

Prepositions - Time

English	Usage	Example
on	 days of the week 	on Monday
in	 months / seasons time of day year after a certain period of time (when?) 	 in August / in winter in the morning in 2006 in an hour
at	 for night for weekend a certain point of time (when?) 	 at night at the weekend at half past nine
since	 from a certain point of time (past till now) 	since 1980
for	over a certain period of time (past till now)	• for 2 years
ago	a certain time in the past	2 years ago
before	earlier than a certain point of time	■ before 2004
to	 telling the time 	• ten to six (5:50)
past	telling the time	ten past six (6:10)
to / till / until	 marking the beginning and end of a period of time 	from Monday to/till Friday from Monday to/till Friday
till / until	■ in the sense of how long something is going to last	He is on holiday until Friday.
by	in the sense of at the latestup to a certain time	 I will be back by 6 o'clock. By 11 o'clock, I had read five pages.

at	meaning next to, by an object	at the door, at the station

on	attached	the picture on the wall
	for a place with a river	 London lies on the Thames.

English	Usage	Example
from	• who gave it	a present from Jane
of	who/what does it belong towhat does it show	 a page of the book the picture of a palace
by	• who made it	a book by Mark Twain
on	 walking or riding on horseback entering a public transport vehicle 	on foot, on horsebackget on the bus
in	entering a car / Taxi	get in the car
off	leaving a public transport vehicle	get off the train
out of	leaving a car / Taxi	get out of the taxi
by	 rise or fall of something travelling (other than walking or horseriding) 	 prices have risen by 10 percent by car, by bus
at	• for age	she learned Russian at 45
about	for topics, meaning what about	we were talking about you

Useful Tip!

- 1. Prepositions are the easiest to understand when they are understood in the context of a sentence.
 - a. Examples:
 - I will be going to the library. (to here is indicating direction)
 - I am waiting <u>at</u> the bus stop. (<u>at</u> here is indicating place)


